

Developed in coordination with D34 administration, the Warrior Brew Bunch coffee cart was created as an opportunity for students who have various learning differences to participate in a hands-on experience that will provide them with some of the skills necessary to enter the working world after graduation. These skills include safe food handling, sanitation, and customer service. This type of real-world working experience will not only teach students valuable skills, but it will also provide them a great sense of accomplishment, independence, and pride

While helping to run the coffee cart, the students are involved in all aspects of the program: order preparation, brewing coffee, and cleaning up after all orders have been completed. Their favorite part is making deliveries and interacting with the staff who have ordered morning beverages. Once all the deliveries are complete, students help count the money that has been collected and calculate the day's profit. All money earned goes back into the program. Any tips collected will go towards a party at the end of the year in recognition of the students' hard work.



### **Building Improvements Are On the Way**

The time is fast approaching when you will start to see major projects starting around the D117 campuses. The various projects are part of a continued plan to provide safe and current facilities to our students, staff, and entire learning community. The Board of Education and D117 Administration work collaboratively to plan for continuous maintenance of our existing structures, as well as to provide excellent facilities.

At Lakes Community High School, there will be an addition to the bleachers at Polley Field stadium. The bleachers will be added to the north end of the already existing seating. The new bleachers will provide 320 additional seats to the stadium capacity. In addition to the new seating, the Polley Field parking lot will undergo a complete renovation.

Antioch Community High School will also undergo some renovations this summer. The ACHS cafeteria will be expanded to the east to allow for all students to eat in one location. Currently, 9th and 10th grade students eat in the cafeteria and 11th and 12th grade students have lunch in the commons area. This expansion will reduce the food service areas, assist with security coverage and safety, allow for the commons area to be used for instructional purposes, and to

provide a space for both D117 and external organizations to host presentations and performances.

The community will also see ACHS roof work happening this summer. We will replace two roof top units (RTUs) that are at the end of their life cycle, as well as install a new RTU above the new cafeteria expansion. Other roof work includes the replacement of a large chiller that provides cooling to the entire north side of ACHS. Along with the cafeteria expansion, four bathrooms will be renovated. They include the bathrooms in the math and Social Studies/World Language hallways.

While you will see the start of the aforementioned work in the next few months, D117 has also established a 5-year facilities plan that includes the following categories: 1) learning environments, 2) supportive learning environments (offices, cafeteria), 3) athletics and activities, 4) technology, and 5) building envelope (roof work, concrete). Some of the capital projects encompassed in the 5-year plan include the replacement of all twelve RTUs and roof work at Lakes Community High School, the turf replacement and track resurfacing at the ACHS stadium, and baseball and softball improvements at both campuses' fields. These are just a few of the future capital projects in D117 and we will continue to work to improve our facilities while being financially responsible to our learning community.

## A Student Will Win a Car Every Year from Raymond Chevrolet Kia




### D117 Departments Focus on Portrait of a Graduate

This year, D117 created a new Strategic Plan with goals to raise student achievement levels, but also to be intentional about making sure our graduates leave high school with six key traits that will help them navigate the world around them.

Some departments naturally teach these skills, but have committed to scaling up and expanding their curriculum to include more. For example, the Fine Arts and English Departments already teach high level "Communication" skills, but they are exploring where they can incorporate more skills, such as "Embraces Diversity" in the novels they read or the plays they rehearse to further allow students to examine diverse perspectives and develop empathy. World Languages explores different cultures and relates them back to students and their own identities, but a way they can scale up "Embraces Diversity" is to encourage students to identify their biases as they learn about things that are often stranger or foreign to them, and teach them ways to build bridges toward other cultures.



The Physical Education and Math Departments allow plenty of opportunity for students to "Be Courageous" by learning new activities that are outside of their comfort zone, but a way to improve upon that is to allow students to stand up for themselves and understand that mistakes are a natural part of learning.

We are helping students become adults who can live, work, and communicate in a global society.

## **Humans of Antioch Project Captures Stories from Our Community**

ou may be familiar with *Humans of New York*, a series of interviews and photographs of the common people of New York and their remarkable stories. ACHS's Ms. Soberano's Intro to Journalism students took the idea of *Humans of New York*, and wrote vibrant and creative stories of a variety of inhabitants of Antioch in the *Humans of Antioch* project.

A couple of the students from the Intro to Journalism class, Ashlyn Olson and Shawn Shaputis, created projects titled Humans in Love and Struggles of Athletics, respectively. According to these Antioch students, this project was all about sharing people's stories and getting to know the town and school environment around us. It is about connecting people through what makes us all human.

Ashlyn and Shawn chose to interview a variety of people within the Antioch community, and the interviews were impromptu, rather than planned out. Ashlyn walked the school community in search of friendly faces. The most surprising part of the stories that Ashlyn wrote for *Humans in Love* was the way people spoke about their loved ones. When Ashlyn asked them about their first loves, they remembered them with such detail. Ashlyn said it was so amazing to hear stories from people about who they are in love with.

Shawn wrote about how athletics shapes the Antioch community. He chose people by finding athletes or coaches to interview, and asked them to dig deeper into the culture of a variety of sports. Shawn himself is an athlete, but he learned about sports that he does not play, simply by talking to others who share a passion for athletics like himself. He learned that athletics and extracurricular activities in general shape

the way people live and think in the future.

Ashlyn chose this theme, *Humans in Love*, because she thinks being in love is such a beautiful part of life. Exploring people's stories of their first loves and current loves was very appealing to Ashlyn.

Ashlyn's project captures the spirit of Antioch, "because there is so much love here. Some people see our town as mundane and small, but it holds so much more value than that because of the people inside of it," says Ashlyn.

"It is so important to hear someone's story, because that is how people connect. Without telling our stories, nobody knows each other. We stay strangers until we share our stories. It brings a sense of connection and community to people who are bold enough to share their stories." Shawn's reflection was that hearing people's sto-

ries "shows you how much you're missing everyday when you walk by a crowd of people. I think more people should be open to new people and experiences in their everyday life."



At Grass Lake, we wholeheartedly embrace this initiative, viewing it as a valuable opportunity to ignite our students' curiosity and inspire them to delve into the fascinating realm of coding and technology.

In today's rapidly advancing world, proficiency in technology is no longer a niche skill but a fundamental requirement for success in various fields. s a young girl, Stacy Kingery was immersed in exploring the world around her. She knew science was all around her. Her grandpa was a scientist and shared his love for the natural world. Digging in the dirt was her jam. It took her a while to realize that this was her gift, from grandpa and to others. She enjoyed the science world through school and envisioned a couple of career paths along the way. She gravitated towards comedy, being a scientist in a lab and then possibly as a teacher. Little did she know that these aspirations would combine and evolve into the career she holds today.

Once she began her college education she discovered she really loved the diversity of science and did not enjoy being boxed into one area. This led her to consider and pursue a wider approach and become a Middle School teacher where she could teach the range of topics. This combined her desire to excite kids to see science all around them, find wonder and joy of questioning, pondering and connecting to the world.

It is no surprise that Stacy has had an enormous impact as the science teacher at Grass Lake School. She has been awarded the distinction of being named one of two teachers in Illinois to participate as a NSTA/SSI Solar Eclipse Partner. There are approximately 125 selected teachers that have access to scientists, periodicals and resources to promote the understanding and viewing of the solar eclipses in a two year window.

This award is benefiting Stacy and Grass Lake School, but it goes beyond that. She is inviting curiosity, wondering and experiencing outside the building, which also aligns with Project Based Learning, being implemented at Grass Lake School. Stacy is working with the students to connect with local libraries so that this eclipse experience can take on a deeper connective meaning in April. Her vision is that not only will her students explore

and dig to learn about this natural phenomena extends into family discussions, it becomes a school and community event that helps others make a connection to their world.

At the end of the day, Stacy can know that because of her love of science, someone else will catch the spark and find their passion.
