





Deep Analysis: SEDOL Long-Range Planning 2014 - 2015

- Participation of all 32 member districts Included member district Superintendents, Business Managers, Local Coordinators of Special Education
- Data generated from cooperative-wide survey that analyzed 15 areas of review and generated 31 pages of member district input
- Recommendations generated from five formal committees.
- Recommendations approved by SEDOL Governing Board on August 26, 2015
- ♦ Implementation on July 1, 2016



SEDOL Service Levels Commencing 2016 - 2017

Program Intensity

- ♦ Service Level 3 Programs for students with significant challenges – 60% funded by IDEA
- ♦ Service Level 2 Programs for students with moderate challenges - 30% funded by IDEA
- ♦ Service Level 1 Programs for students with mild challenges – No supplement by IDEA

Net Effects

- ◆ 17% Return of IDEA to member districts. SEDOL retains 43% of IDEA vs. 60%
- ♦ Service Level 3 programs tuition decreased 7%
- ♦ Service Level 2 programs' tuition increased by 6.7%
- Service Level 1 programs' tuition increased by 20.4%

Emerging Support Provided by SEDOI

- Continued development of sector programming for the needs of 2, 3, 4 or more districts.
- Continued development of building and sector classroom programs for students with severe autism.
- Training of member district teachers in non-violent crisis prevention and intervention techniques (CPI).
- Support for local districts in assessing instructional growth of students with significant challenges.
- ♦ Expertise in use of assistive technology, software and applications.
- ... And any other opportunity that may allow SEDOL to better serve its constituent member school districts.
